He very expertly showed how his surf boarder can accelerate from a full stop to warp speed to inflict a broadside hit on with his super powered surfboarder. By jumping the foam bulwarks of the Noddle, the surfer easily dislodged the cabin that fortunately had sufficient buoyancy to remain afloat before sinking to the depths of "Lake Kevin". (and we thought the junior skippers would be a problem). During the event we received membership applications from **Jim Shaffer** and his wife, **Bonnie**. Bonnie & Jim both retired from Foss Maritime. Jim recently retired as a tug captain. We welcome them to our club and hope to see them at our future events.

Many thanks to all who helped make the 2020 Hobby Expo a successful event for our club. I appreciate everyone's support with their attendance as well as the many boats they brought to display and/or run on the pond.

**Ron Bray** and **Bill Heath** both entered models in the scale judging event. Bill Heath's nice Darby class tug, the Nor 'wester was successful in winning BOTH 1st and 2<sup>nd</sup> places for the boat category. I suspect a clerical error was made and 2<sup>nd</sup> place was intended for Ron Bay's new Coho ferry boat as the 2<sup>nd</sup> place award to Bill's Nor 'wester had Ron's name as the owner of the Nor 'wester. In any case, congratulations to both Bill and Ron for entering two fine models and representing our club in this event.

Again the year, **Dave Green** is ready to work with the Bellevue Park Department. Our plans and necessary insurance documents are ready as we await the opening of the registration system. As with last year we plan to reserve only the regatta date and not the fun float dates. Only the regatta is when we need exclusive use of the cemented area for our setup and more structured event. For fun floats we will not reserve any specific area. Rather, we will use the walkway area and the cement area if it is not in use by another group. The Parks Department is aware of our full schedule and will alert us if any areas are reserved on our fun float dates. Also the Parks Department has given us the lower non-profit group rate for our regatta. There are some changes to the administration group for this park and we hope that they will not adversely affect reservations for this year. We appreciate Dave's work with the Parks Department and hope we can continue our close working relation. I think all would agree that the "meat" or our meetings is the time we spend on show 'n tell topics. While we no longer have the award for the most frequent show 'n Teller, our activity is been strong so far this year. To augment these presentations, we have excellent video facilities at our Makerspace meeting location. Photos are easy to project as well as physical objects can be projected on the dual projection screens. These tools can help make these presentations easier and more effective. Set up of the projector equipment is quick and easy. If you have some photos that will enhance your presentation or help better explain a procedure or project, you can use the projector in a similar manner. The projector accepts photos in JPEG, PDF format and videos in AVI or MP4 format directly. You can plug in a USB flash drive and the projector will display photos individually or automatically as a slide show. The projector also has HDMI input for direct connection to a laptop or notebook computer. If you need help, let me know so we maximize our use and benefit from these new tools.

**Robert Osmond** purchased a partially assembled Krick steam powered stern wheel river boat kit at Hobby Expo. Since the plan details were not clear or partially absent, he called Mr. Krick for advice and more pages of instructions.

A wet and windy Friday night gave way to a calmer Saturday morning where 8 members of the Skagit Ship Modelers gathered together for the morning breakfast meeting at the Mount Vernon Denny's. It was nice of Randy Flodguist to pick up Wayne Martin and bring him as he had been missing the meetings with a health issue.

Most notable discussion was about the NW Model Hobby EXPO show from the previous weekend. The boat area and number of people and boats were nice to see with an over flow of models present. The new show layout was an improvement for the flow of people and what they saw. Having the contest models display moved towards the front entrance was a nice change as there were also more boat entries this year than has been seen in the past couple of years. The fact that a boat won the best of show was a nice bit of news as well. Swap meet was bigger and even things for

the nautical minded could be found. I went down with a couple of large boats and even took the time to put them in the water for a while. Those of us that went, commented on the noticeable missing man in Tom Stevens being gone, but his boats were still there with his friend Tom Edwards. Bringing them made it a nice to see. The rest of the show was good and always a nice welcome break in the middle of winter. A side note was mentioned as there was a post from the organizers of the show that there will be a mid-summer swap meet for the hobbies coming this summer on July 11th at the fairgrounds! This may be a chance to either get a table and clean some stuff out or find some interesting things. More information to come in the future.

Another item discussed was to maybe have a fun float at a friend of Kevin Klocke's, who lives nearby him and has a pond. He runs his boats there and the guy is a model fan as well as a retired tug captain! Hopefully, get more on that in the very near future. Also noted that the Anacortes Waterfront Festival is on June 6 & 7 and NWR/CSM's regatta is on Saturday June 6, the same weekend. Keith

Schermerhorn will be splitting the shows, but will have boats in Anacortes for both days and be present on Sunday. Larry Stiles informed us the sailing group has still been floating at their usual space out by Deception Pass, but has slowed due to the poor weather.

Show and tell consisted of Keith's continued work on the CVE aircraft carrier and showing some of the small work on the ship platforms being made that attach to the sides of the flight deck. These parts are made of plastic, metal mesh, brass wire, and

etched stanchions. Small details on a small scale ship make them tough to do, especially the railings.

The other show and tell was a little easier to see. It was some of the brass work on the railings and mast parts of the larger Miki Miki tug LT147, a very large ocean going tugboat of wooden construction originally commissioned by the United States Army during World War II. Being in 1/32nd scale makes it easier to work with and not so taxing on the eyes! The main railings were made using commercial stanchions and strung with brass wire running through them. The Gun tug railings were all made from







brass tube and rod since they are shorter and a bit different than the regular railings. A note to bending brass wire/tube/strips is to heat the metal with a torch so that it changes color a bit (a red glow can be good momentarily) as this "softens" the metal and makes it more pliable for bending without binding/resisting the tension. Made the tug's gun this way as well as the forward railings. The rings for the parts on the mast and boom were made of brass tube cut to size and details soldered on. The mast and boom are made from old recycled fishing rods. These make for a great tapered mast since they are stiff and hollow for allowing wire to be run down inside for lights.

A few more discussions of various topics were heard, breakfast enjoyed, and time was coming to a close as Denny's restaurant was getting busy. So we paid our checks and headed to our home ports for the day until we convene again next month.

Skagit Ship Modelers Club Meetings -- As always, we have our meetings the first Saturday of each month, starting at 9 AM, at the Mount Vernon Denny's restaurant at 100 E College Way, Mt Vernon, WA and all are welcomed and encouraged to join in with conversation and show-n-tells.
