The meeting again broke the 20 members mark at 23! We started gathered at our usual location at the The Facility Makerspace at Edmonds Community College in Lynnwood, WA.



Show and Tell:


Mike Gullikson started off the with some fine 3D printed parts from Shapeways that are guns and figures. They had very nice detail.



John LeGate was up next with a project he started in 1954 when he was stationed in Korea. It is a Chris Craft runabout. It is made of sheet balsa where he added strips to make it look better. A cabin has been added. He needs help with the servo linkages.






Richard Lennington stepped up showing us a nice springer kit from Zippkits. It is an all inclusive kit that includes the boat, running gear, hardware, glue and transmitter for \$300. He also offered up some shelf storage containers for anyone interested.



Robert Osmond came to the front and mentioned that Ron Bray will be giving us a presentation next month on fiberglass techniques. This is what makes the club great, spreading our particular expertise. He also mentioned the Puget Sound Maritime Historical Society. A membership is \$60 per year. The membership consists of boat and ship people. It includes two tickets to MOHAI, discounts and newsletter. The society has copies of plans. He showed us an old, small ship model and a new model kit.



Steve Sunich came in with a new project. He found a 1930's tugboat that was converted to a yacht and has started that project with his own drawings developed from pictures. He showed us his profile with buttock lines and a scaled table of offsets. He thought he would try a lath and plaster approach for the hull. It is just frames with small lath with fiberglass over. It has been challenging, but with some time it might work out.





Kevin Nolet brought an interesting project. It is a very sophisticated “Tiatanic” made from Legos. It is incredible in its detail. It is 54” long and breaks into three parts. One can see the interior contents of the ship. It has over 2000 pieces and a 450 page instruction manual. It took him 8 days to complete and three manuals.







Allan Wing, our motor expert, talked about the typical speed 500 motors a lot of people use and typically over tax them. He gave us a synopsis of selecting motors to avoid overheating, excess current and better performance. There are motors that handle up to 350 watts. Hobby King sells a motor that is an "outrunner" that can handle 350 watts.




Allan gave away a sailboat that is about 3' long and has quite a big sail area. Steve Sunich said he has the same boat and that they are very fun to sail. A happy Mike Gullikson took the boat home.



David Zanzig was working on a Coast Guard boat windshield that is laser cut. He showed us the parts cut from a laser cutter and explained the difference the speed of the cutter makes and the quality of the cut.



Paul Williams presented an interesting paperback book about 23 steam powered submarines used in WWI by the Royal Navy. He offered it to anyone interested in reading it. Book title is "The K Boats".







New Trick from Keith – White Out

This is a new trick I have learned from a fellow modeler who does plastic models. How many times have you had a small area or line from something you made that needed just a slight filling?. I would usually mix a small batch of putty up that would be 150 times what I needed. But the little trick I learned was to use "White Out" correction fluid as the filler. This comes in either the usual bottle with a foam brush or in a pen format.

It fills small gaps quickly and can be cleaned up by wiping with mineral spirits or denatured alcohol. Now, this isn't for major gaps. This works best on small hairline cracks or even dimples on the surface when painting over.

The projects that I have been working on:
Paint went on to the new purse seiner fishing boat named the *Erindale*. This color is as close as I could find the original boats color "springtime green".

My other project is a 1/48th scale WWII ATF tug that was part of the Scott Baumen collection of models I bought at the 2023 Hobby show swap meet. This model has a fiberglass hull, deck, and main housing lower unit. The superstructure was built of Sintra. All the decks are hand planked to make it more authentic. I am slowly building all the main parts and now working to get the deck installed along with the running gear. Here are a couple photos of the current progress:



FREE -- HULL'S LOOKING FOR A GOOD HOME

Here are two all wood, scratch built, bread & butter hulls made by a master craftsman before he recently passed. They were given to Portland Club and asked our help in finding good homes for them. Each would make excellent RC boats.

The 1st hull is 66" Long, 12" wide, and 6 ½ tall & has a brass cutwater in the bow. It's very well constructed & appears to be a generic pleasure or launch style boat. It's made of good quality softer wood making it easier to gouge and hollow out the interior of the hull.



Below is the **2nd hull**. It is 55 ½" Long, 10" Wide and 5 ½" Tall. It's the same construction and woods used in the 66" hull. It also has a brass cutwater on the bow. It's likely this is a generic work or freighter style hull. But the raised portion of the upper bow can easily be modified, reducing or eliminating, to change its appearance from work to a pleasure craft .



Both boats are being stored with Bob Muller, Commodore of the PMPBA in Tualatin OR. If you are interested in one or both call Bob at 503-860-9016. Act soon, Bob would like to have a bit more room in his garage again.





New Log Boom Boat Design – YouTube
