

a 3 point spread for all first place of each size class is a tribute to the course layout which was more compressed this year to help reduce perception tests of previous year's courses.





Steven Morgret, who has been a guest before, presented his latest combat cruiser and made a pitch for the warship combat group. They have a new location which allows them to shoot at each other. He stated the best way to adhere anything to polyethylene was to employ hot glue or silicone caulk.

Robert Osmond brought in his large modified invader tug to show its progress and what changes he has made. He also brought in a nifty small sanding tool he ordered from Micro Mart.



Following the break, Mel discussed details of the upcoming regatta and requested help in loading and unloading items from our storage facility.

Apparently, we


are being charged \$30 by the Bellevue park department for each sanctioned club event and \$1.12 per head for our regatta. He stated parking
