From the Wheel House Mel Suelzle

August 2018

With the newsletter deadline being before the Portland Regatta, we will have both the upcoming regattas in Tualatin and Bellingham reported in the September issue.

As of this writing, many of us are busy charging batteries and checking our boats getting ready for the trip to Tualatin. Since this regatta fills the day and the evening after the group dinner, our lighting systems need to be in good working order. Aimee Eng will have her lighted gates set up for our entertainment. The lights make it very obvious when an errant boat hits one of the gates. For those not attending this event will have more time to get ready for the Bellingham Tug Regatta formerly known as the Foss Cup. This is a very popular event that tests the tug skills in barge handling and docking of a derelict vessel.

As reported last month and repeated at the meeting we only have two more meetings before we need to elect officers for next year starting in January. No one has stepped forward for the club president position to assume the slot that I will vacate after the December dinner meeting. The club is running well, with several new active members and excellent attendance at our events. It would be disappointing to lose our momentum due to a lapse in leadership. Again, I urge you to consider serving the club in this capacity.
