SPECIAL EVENT

Preparations for the **Foss Cup** are progressing nicely. A memo and photo from *Foss Maritime* is attached to this newsletter and the money from Foss for the regatta has arrived. Most of the Foss contribution will be used to buy awards. 14 awards will be presented for tug competition, First, Second and Third places in 4 different tug classes.

The classes are Mini Tug, Small Tug, Large Tug and Maxi Tug. The Minis will be defined by length, tugs less than 15 inches long. The 3 remaining classes will be defined by weight. We feel this approach better defines a tugs power, based on batteries and motors.

There will be a "Sponsors Award", presented to a tug skipper by a representative of **Foss Maritime**. This award will be given for all around appearance and operation.

The **"FOSS CUP"** is a perpetual award that will have the winning skipper's name and tug name on it. The Foss Cup will be kept at Foss, and a separate award in recognition of the Foss Cup will be given to the winning skipper to take home.

Regatta Events

Tugboat Race: All tugs will race in their classes. Different classes will have different distances to race, with the largest tugs having the longest route. Tugs will race around buoys.

Bollard Pull: Simply, how powerful is your tug. Your tugs bollard pull will be measured with a digital scale and converted into points. These points will go towards the tugs total score.

Salvage at Sea: (Proposed TEAM event) Two tugs will approach, collect and retrieve a derelict vessel. Points will be given based on elapsed time. Teams will be "Luck of the Draw" no ringers here.

Tug & Barge Handling: The premier event of the regatta, tugs will move one barge, each class will have an appropriately sized barge and all tugs in a class use the same barge. Full Scale tug skippers from Foss Maritime will judge and assist skippers with rigging the barges.

IMPORTANT: THE **FOSS CUP** IS NOT JUST A COMPETITION. The intention is to get lots of tugs on the water. Not just some tug drivers, but all tug skippers.

Don't be intimidated, don't worry about not being "Good Enough". Enter the regatta, put your boat in the water and take advantage of the knowledge available. Most important,

HAVE FUN

We never have had a regatta with a class just for minitugs, there are no experts there, so try that class.

Bob Jacobsen (Galaxy Hobby) has a great deal on a Lindberg tug kit and a 2 channel radio with batteries \$99. total. There is still time to build a mini if you don't have a tug.

DOOR PRIZES: We are trying to attract some prizes to be given away prior to the awards ceremony. Only registered skippers are eligible and only one prize per skipper. The prizes are independent of competition score. Winners will be selected by drawing.

PAGE FILLER

The first marine cycloidal drive was developed by a German immigrant named

Frederick Kristen here on Puget Sound. The drive was placed on a 38 foot launch designated M-879. The drive was 3 feet wide, had 8 rotor blades and was powered by a 160-hp gas motor. The first drive was built in 1922. The system was tried in the U.S. up until 1928 when the Kristen-Boeing propeller Co. sold the company back to Kristen for \$1. He took it back to Germany, and now U.S. boat builders buy cycloidal drives from Voith-Schneider

(a German company).
