# The Soviet Red Banner Northern Fleet and the Russian Destroyer Razymnia

By January , 1942 just prior to the climactic battle of Stalingrad, the Soviet Red Banner Northern Fleet had undertaken earnest operations, both offensive and defensive, against Germany. The surface units consisted principally of Type D-3 torpedo cutters, small hunters, the Destroyer Leader 'Baku', and four Type 7 destroyers *Revnostia*, *Raziyarena*, *Gramyashchia* and the subject of my model '*Razymnia*'.

The Project 7 destroyers had their beginnings in the 1933 program. The TYPE 7 was evaluated after completion and the design was upgraded. A new engine room and enhanced A-A armament resulted, and they were designated TYPE 7U. One destroyer, the "Opytnyi" was a one-of-a-kind experimental ship designated TYPE 7E.

The Red Banner Northern Fleet participated in both offensive and defensive operations. Offensively, ships participated in fire support missions during landings, patrols in the White Sea, ASW sweeps and at least one attack on the occupied Port of Narvik, Norway.

Defensively convoy escort duty, patrolling the Kola Inlet and providing AA defense for the ports they visit.

Convoy PQ-17 was inbound near the Kola Inlet when the convoy escort commander learned the DKM 'Tirpitz' had sortied. The convoy was ordered to scatter. Northern Fleet submarine 'K-21' with Captain, 2nd range Lunin intercepted the 'Tirpitz' and torpedoed it, forcing retirement. The Northern Fleet sortied, rounded up what merchant ships it could find and escorted them into port. For this action, 'K-21' was designated a "Guards" ship.

In March of 1942, 'Gramyaschia' attacked and sank U-585. Shortly there after she shot down her 14th aircraft, earning the designation "Guards" and entitling her to wear the Red and Black ribbon on her ensign.

Another special mission was when Admiral E.S. Umasheva, aboard 'Baku', lead 'Razuminia', 'Revnostina' and 'Raziyarenia' by way of the Northern Sea route to rendezvous with an American Cruiser in Vladivostock. Aboard was Lend Lease payment. 'Revnostina' struck a mine sunk. Delivery completed, the squadron returned to Kola without incident.
