As with any event, there are always opportunities to help out to keep things moving. Help with registration, harbor master, computer scoring, setup/clean up, and raffle ticket sales. Please contact me if you would like to help out with any of the mentioned positions.

Reminder to all: This is a skills contest that is meant to have FUN (we're not playing for a million \$\$-just bragging rights!) Hope to see you there as a competitor or spectator.

Keith has been a very active member of our club having done the newsletter in the mid 90's and then became president after



Tom Stevens for 4 years until 2002. He has won numerous trophies and awards including best of show at the Puyallup Expo in 1996 with his Moon Shadow and again in 2000. He has participated in numerous competitions and events including five trips to San Francisco, several trips to Canada (Nanaimo, Vancouver, Burnaby), the Tidewater cup in Spokane, Anacortes (where his sailboat suffered), and of course, our spring regatta and the Foss Cup of which he is the director.
