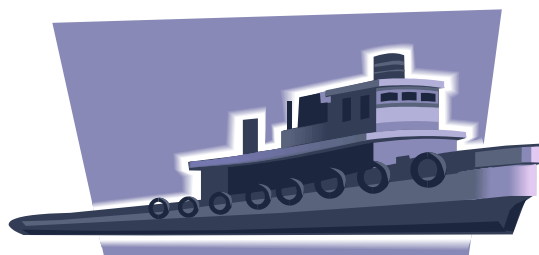

Minutes of February 3, 2011

Allan announced that the Bellevue Pond is no longer an ice rink and has been refilled with water. The members quickly voted to have the Sunday fun float at this location rather than at the South Lake Union oval. A special thanks was given to **Dave Green** for filing the papers and reserving the pond for our nautical activities. Only a Bellevue resident may file the papers.

The Hobby Expo at the Monroe Fairgrounds will be held Feb. 11-13th with setup at 10 o'clock on Friday. Everyone is expected to pay an entry admission each day. This event provides a great opportunity to pick up or swap for irresistible treasures. The schedule of events at the pond is on their website and will include a navigation course, fun runs, sailboat race, polo events and radio tosses. It was suggested that we bring a boat or two that the public can operate at specified times.

Allan asked for suggestions for solicitations to provide auction items for the June regatta. Several were mentioned and noted.

Requests for hats and jackets were expressed and Mel Suelzle will look into the availability and costs and report back.

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After five years of publishing our Bilge Pump, **Darlene Wing** has retired and is passing the baton to **Lee Stewart**. Many, many thanks to Darlene for an outstanding job. The newsletter has always been attractive, on time, very informative and well-illustrated. Allan put out a call for more people to submit material for articles to fill the newsletter as it is always a challenge to make it interesting. A suggestion was made that the newsletter layout be rearranged so that important items have a more prominent position.

Continuing with the plan to provide helpful, instructional info at the meetings, Mel presented an excellent discussion on how to wire LED lights for our boats. A handout was given to everyone present indicating the method of selecting the correct layout and resistors for each circuit. This sparked a lively discussion by the membership which produced a good flow of information. Our webmaster, **Mike Jones**, will place the handout in the technical section of the website for those not present and for anyone interested in lighting their boats.

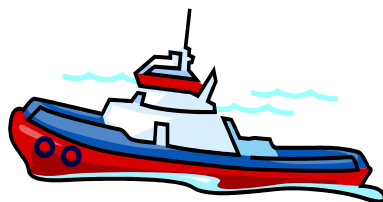
After a brief break it was show and tell time. Mel led off with his New York Fireboat 343, a 1/48th scale build. Since no plans were available, he drew the lines from pictures and drawing found on the internet. He carved a half hull of foam and then cut it up to obtain the sections so that he could produce the frames. The finished hull has been epoxied, bathtub tested and appears to be quite stable, weighing in at 9 lbs. with batteries, motors, etc.

Jim Sisley brought in his wheeled model of the BB 56 battleship **USS Washington**, which he had run at Bellevue Pond last month while it was still an ice rink. He displayed a book and Navel History magazine detailing the history of this ship and then discussed his experiences with this ship. This ship was Admiral Lee's flagship for 33 months and survived the war without any battle damage. Indeed, this was a very interesting topic and enjoyed by all.

Earl Anderson described his new Springer project made with a thin fiberglass hull, water cooled motor and speed control, a brass keel and rudder and 1/16th styrene construction above the hull. Knee reinforcements were noted, added to minimize damage from pool sides during competition.

Tom Stevens brought in 1/24th scale figures which he purchased at the Stanwood Country store which he intends to modify for maritime use.

The meeting concluded at 2105, chairs were stacked and everyone headed back to their respective ports, having been satisfied with a very interesting and productive meeting. Thanks to all the participants for their efforts to keep us afloat.



TIPS 'n TRICKS

A feature of our newsletter highlights member suggestions for making modeling easy and more fun.

From **Dave Feray** – You can make a good styrene glue by dissolving about a teaspoon of styrene chips in about 2oz of MEK (available at Lowes and other hardware stores) in a small (about 4 ounce) glass jar, with a tight-fitting lid (MEK evaporates very fast, and is very flammable). Make a small hole in the lid, to a size you can plug tight with something, and into which you can insert a small brush. Cap the hole and let it sit overnight. The styrene will dissolve and you will have glue you can brush onto styrene parts.

Dave makes up the joints with tape, getting them in perfect alignment, then brush a bit of the glue on the inside. It sets in seconds and is fully hard in a few minutes. You can use the glue to fill very small gaps, too.

Tired of cleaning up when your paint and glue bottles tip over. **Tom Stevens** suggests putting them in your spare tugboat tires. They provide a good broad base to help prevent spills.

If you are in for more custom solutions, Tom also suggests building custom holders for glues and brushes that will keep everything upright and handy when you need them. They are easy to build a good use of scrap materials.

Hobby Expo was a success and Allan thanked all who assisted.

For the education session this month we had two presentations. The first was by **Bob Wickham** about computing the displacement of a model. Bob gave us some interesting mathematical formulae, which will be posted on our website, and started a discussion among the members as to several other ways to calculate this magic number. Heck, I thought you just added weight until the thing looked good on the water!

The second talk was given by Allan on the various types of batteries available for our use and how to take care of them. He handed out a very informative paper to go with his comments. This too will be added to the website. Following these talks we took a short break and returned to **"SHOW & TELL"**.

Mike Jones started it off with a through talk on the 1/32nd scale model he is building, from scratch, of the **W.T. Preston**. This was a stump pulling, snag boat and dredge which plied the Sound and Lake Washington in the early 20th Century. It was steam powered and Mike intends to replicate it fully.



Bob Wickham returned with his **Lois J** to demonstrate the extensive lighting system he installed, operated by recently installed Switch 8 module. Bob's detail and talent is very admirable. Too bad he does not share it with us more often.



Phil Northrup next showed us the start of a large Springer-like tug boat he is building on commission. Seems he met someone at Expo who had to have a boat by this illustrious builder. Pays to go to Expo!



Dain Webster hauled out what looked like a model which had been eaten by rats. However it turned out this was how it looked before it under went its annual refurbishing. Dain is a member of "Queen's Own", a group which does real battles with model warships. They fire real ammo and in order to show the hits on the ships they cover them like you would cover an airplane. By the end of a "season" the covering has to be removed and replaced. In its current condition you could see the method of firing the guns and the storage facilities for the ammo and the compressed air, which is used to fire them.

The superstructure is very modular and the boat has various floatation devices to keep the sinking hull from fully disappearing to the bottom of the pond or lake. You think you have problems knowing which way your model is going at a distance from you, try firing on an “enemy” ship at that pace. .

Barrett Bertrand showed us a steam whistle which he had acquired to be put on a steam tractor which he is reconstructing for a local museum. He is looking for some addition help in this project. He also showed a picture of and gave us some stats on a steam tug , the Black Prince, which plied the Snohomish River and could make it up to Marblemount, the only boat of it size to be able to do so. Barry hopes to make a model of the Black Prince to put in the same museum.



Without further comments from the assemble masses, Allan closed the meeting at 2108 and after cleaning the room, we mosied out to our vehicles.
