



Also attending were about a dozen or so members from the Spokane Model Boat Club that hosts this event each year with the sponsorship of Tidewater. The hot weather, typical for this event, was replaced by much cooler temperatures and even an occasional rain shower.

The event was held at a pond on the property of the local power company, Avista. This manmade pond has many large rocks and a fountain that contributes to a most interesting and challenging event.
