Our skipper, **Richard Lennington**, got our June club meeting underway with a discusion of upcoming events and club business.

The club's regatta is coming soon and preparations are being made. Thank you to **Bryan Morse, Robert Newell, Robert Osman, Bob Spiger, Steve Sunich** and **Dave White** for accepting roles. More volunteers would be helpful to make this event fun for everyone.

On August 2nd, at Downtown Park in Bellevue, Washington, our big competition for the year will combine what once was two events:

The 43rd Annual Northwest RC Ship Modelers Navigation Regatta and The 4th Annual Northwest RC Ship Modelers Tugboat Regatta

The Navigation Regatta has been held every year (except for 2020) since 1982. Recently, the running of our navigation competition was held in June. The big change this year is that this event will be held in August, on the same day as the tugboat competition.

The Tugboat Regatta is similar to events held in the past. From 1996 to 2021, it was known as Pacific Northwest RC Tug Regatta. This competition was known in previous years as The Foss Cup. This year, the events will happen in the same place on the same day.

There will be awards for first, second, and third place in small, medium, and large classes for each competition. We will also include an award for overall top navigator!

Another upcoming event the club participates in is the Fishermen's Fall Festival in Seattle. It was brought to our attention that it was scheduled for the same day as the September fun float in Bellevue. A vote was held among attending club members. Some members wanted to go to Seattle and different members wanted to continue our regular Bellevue meetup. It was decided that there is enough interest for the club to go ahead with both. Saturday, September 13th will be a fun day. Make sure you attend one of these events!

Show and Tell





Mike Gullikson brought a hydroplane hull in progress and a new tool to help him put it together. To soften and put the bend into the basswood stringers, Mike built a steam box. The steam box is 50 inches long, 6 inches wide and 6 inches tall. It is assembled from the Rockler Steam Bending Kit. The hydroplane model is a kit from MLBoatworks.com. When it is all done the boat will be a scale model of the 1974 Valu-Mart ready for competition with another club, Puget Sound Fast Electrics.



Robert Wickham was showing a beautifully constructed Great Lakes freighter built from the Dumas kit. He added lights, a turning radar antenna, a bow thruster, and equipped the ship with switches from Turnigy. Also, he installed a Pittman motor that runs well and is "quite quiet" when compared to the Dumas motor. With all of the electronics, Robert warned us that RF interference is an issue and a common ground is important.



Robert Osman brought the Great Lakes freighter that he built from scratch. He built his *EM Ford* ship when he still lived in Texas. Robert brought three books to share that he used to research the topic of Great Lakes ore freighters.



Northwest Radio Control Ship Modelers

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Steve Sunich gave us an update on his work-of-art-in-progress, the tugboat/yacht *St. Eval.* The hull paint is now on. He showed us a very convincing chrome on the funnel that he achieved using Krylon spray paint and avoiding the messy and costly chroming process otherwise needed to get the right look.



Jon McCool showed how he is overhauling his Springer tug, *Coolwind*. The tug has been using a nice brushless motor from Zippkits.com since 2022. Nice as it was, to compete in Springer polo in this club, a bigger motor was needed. He installed a brushed 500-size motor he got from Robert Osman, who also provided help and guidance with the project.







Paul Williams talked about picking up a five foot long LED colored light strip with a remote control for \$3.00 at Dollar Tree store. It is fun to experiment with!



Allen Wing brought the completed frame of a Chesapeake Skipjack that he is building. He plans to skin the boat with 1/8 inch plywood. Allen is building the boat from plans found on the Internet. It will be 45 inches long and about 4 inches deep.



Bob Brown told us the story behind his new boat. He told us he has a new boat because, "like potato chips, you can't have just one."

It started with a purchase of the Motion RC Heng Long Harbor Tug. He was unhappy with the radio and motor and looked into sending it back. He decided to customize instead and added a 500 size motor from Harbor Models, a Kort nozzle and then painted

it to match the colors used by the Seattle Fire Department. The name Four Heroes is in honor of the four firefighters who lost their lives fighting the Mary Pang fire in 1995.





Richard Goodrich, Robert Osman, and **Patrick Plueard** brought items to share with club members and Jon McCool walked away with the raffle prize: the Midwest Products Skipjack model kit.

May's Mystery Boat Photo By William K Schemerhorn

In the May edition of the newsletter on page four Robert Osmond provided a couple old club photos of a shallow draft push tug. Well, let it be known that that model is one of mine made in the early 1990's. The model is of the 74 foot tunnel hulled river tug "*Bear*" named after one of the lakes it would pass through on the way to the arctic. It is in 1/24th scale and completely scratch built from drawings obtained from the



Whatcom Museum of History and Art. Construction was mostly balsa wood then covered with Plastruct on the decks and house. The model was powered by a 12 volt motors with the 1-inch props located in tunnels. This was following the prototypes design that would allow it to operate in shallow rivers. As unique as this model was, it was under powered even though I did run it at a couple tug events (won an honorary award at the Seaspan cup in 1996). The model resides with me to this day in my office.

Some history of the real vessel.

The boat was designed in 1939 by Coolidge and Hansen of Seattle (latter became known as Elliot Bat Design) by Mr. Hansen. The construction for this, and one other like it was started in 1940 Saint Louis where the boats were built in halves. They were then barged up the Mississippi river to Michigan where they would join the two halves together. From there they would transit the great lakes to Canada where they would travel up Canada's McKenzie River on their way to the Arctic to be used in transporting equipment for oil exploration. On the way up, there was a



detour where the boats could not transit some rapids. So they loaded them onto trailers, trucked 70 mile around the rapids, before going back into the river where they would continue their journey. This journey would never be finished as they were as far as they could go in 1941 when winter set in. The trip was to continue the following spring. But the outbreak of war late in 1941 meant the end of the expedition for oil in the far north. I have little other information as to what happened with the boats after that time.
